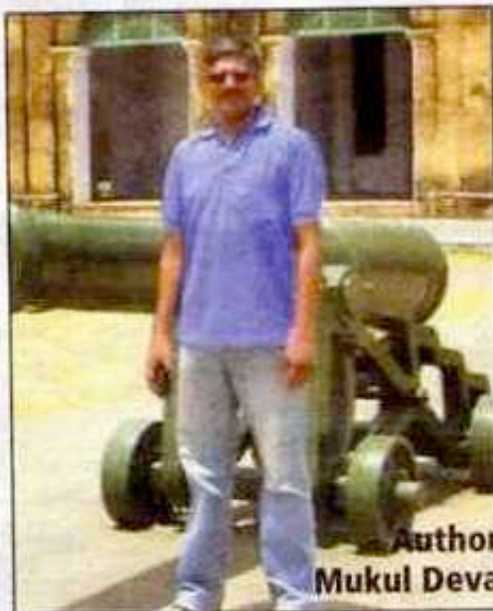

Taking the vast story forward is the sequel *Salim Must Die*. Now, when you have brought one of the characters — Salim to this book why



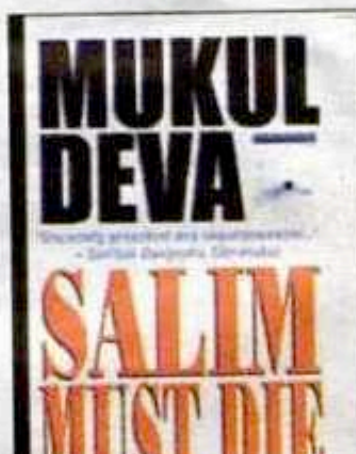
